I would like to take this opportunity to thank Josip Guć for his cooperation and enrichment of this issue of *Jahr*.

As also previously mentioned, additional space has been given to two papers in a new section of *Jahr* – Artificial Intelligence Humanities. The first, studying the intention and experience of using metaverse, and the second, labelling the psychological impact of colour in films for deep learning processing based on a humanities approach. I would like to thank Kyumin Moon for extensive cooperation in preparing this section.

I am also pleased to see the continuation of scientific conferences as two scientific meeting reviews are also a part of this issue.

I would like to thank the members of the Editorial Board, peerreviewers, and all other associates included in the creation of this issue. I owe special thanks to the Executive

Editor, Managing Editors (I am also welcoming our new managing editor), and our Language Editors for their tremendous help, but also special thanks go to the editors of the special sections.
